Thomas John Langton is the patriarch of this family in Canada. This is his story...

Thomas John Langton was born 24 Aug 1893 (or 1894) in Clapham, Surrey, England. He died 28 June 1932 in Kitchener, Ontario, Canada. He married Mary Ivy Botheras Hawken on 06 Dec 1924 in Kitchener, Ontario, Canada, daughter of William Hawken and Hannah Botheras. She was born between Jul-Sep 1902 in Penzance, Cornwall, England. She died in 1994 in Ontario, Canada.

Thomas John Langton arrived on his own in the Port of Quebec on 12 Sep 1911 aboard the Lake Manitoba (Port of Departure Liverpool, England). His future wife Ivy arrived with her parents and two younger brothers William Charles and George in the Port of New York on 06 Apr 1913 aboard the Philidephia (Port of Departure Southampton, England). Thomas John and Ivy met and married a little over a decade later and together they had four children.

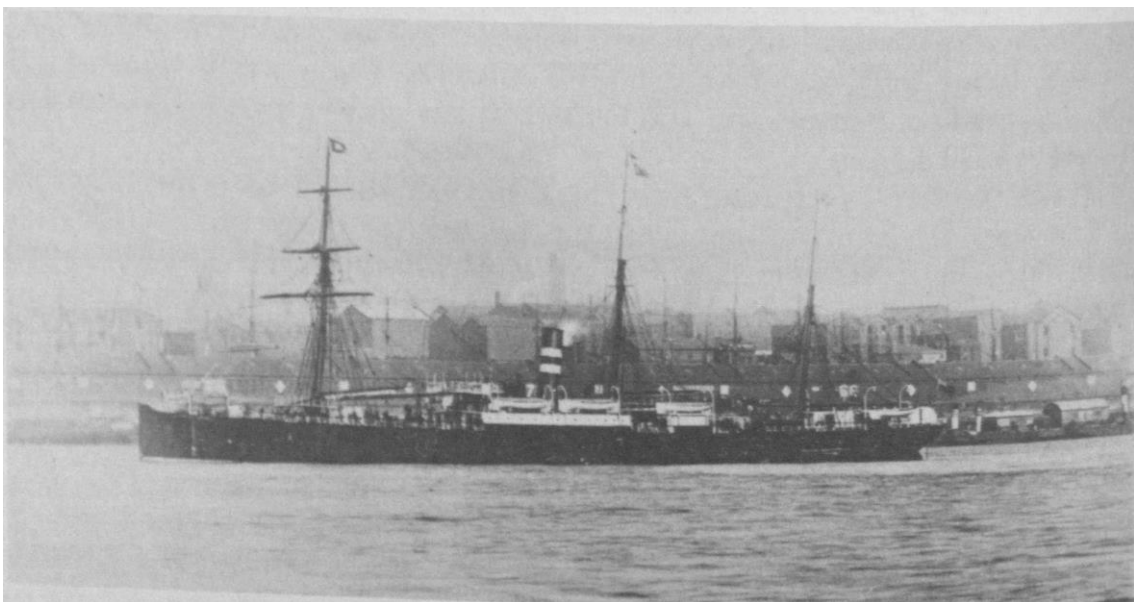
Eileen Langton was born in 1925 in Ontario, Canada. She died in 1965.

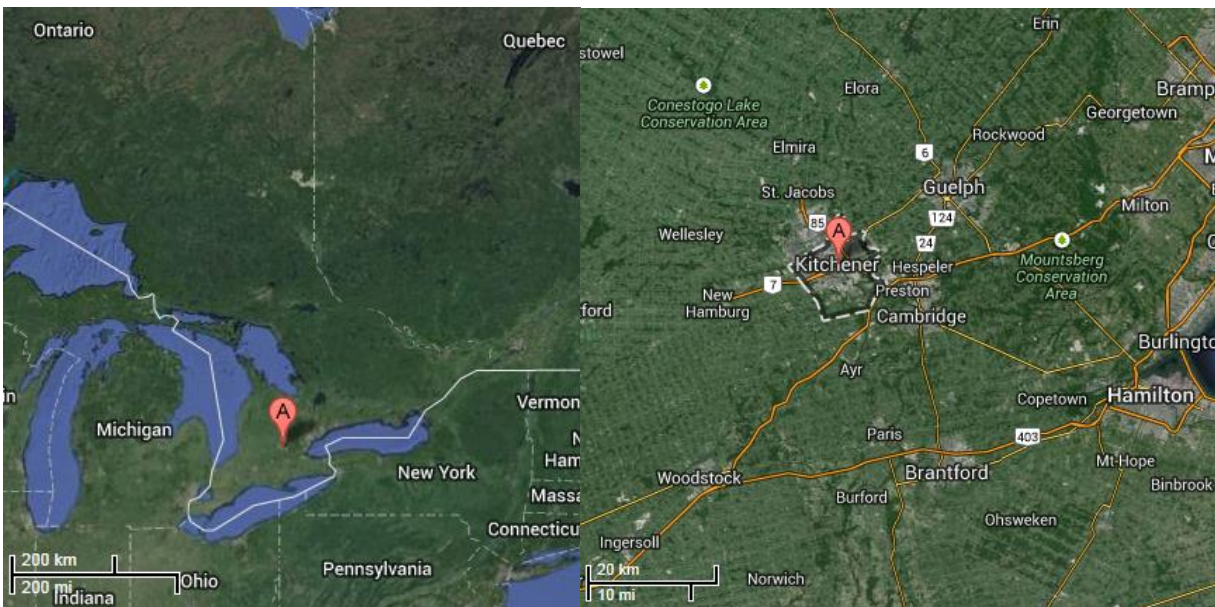

Kitchener, Ontario



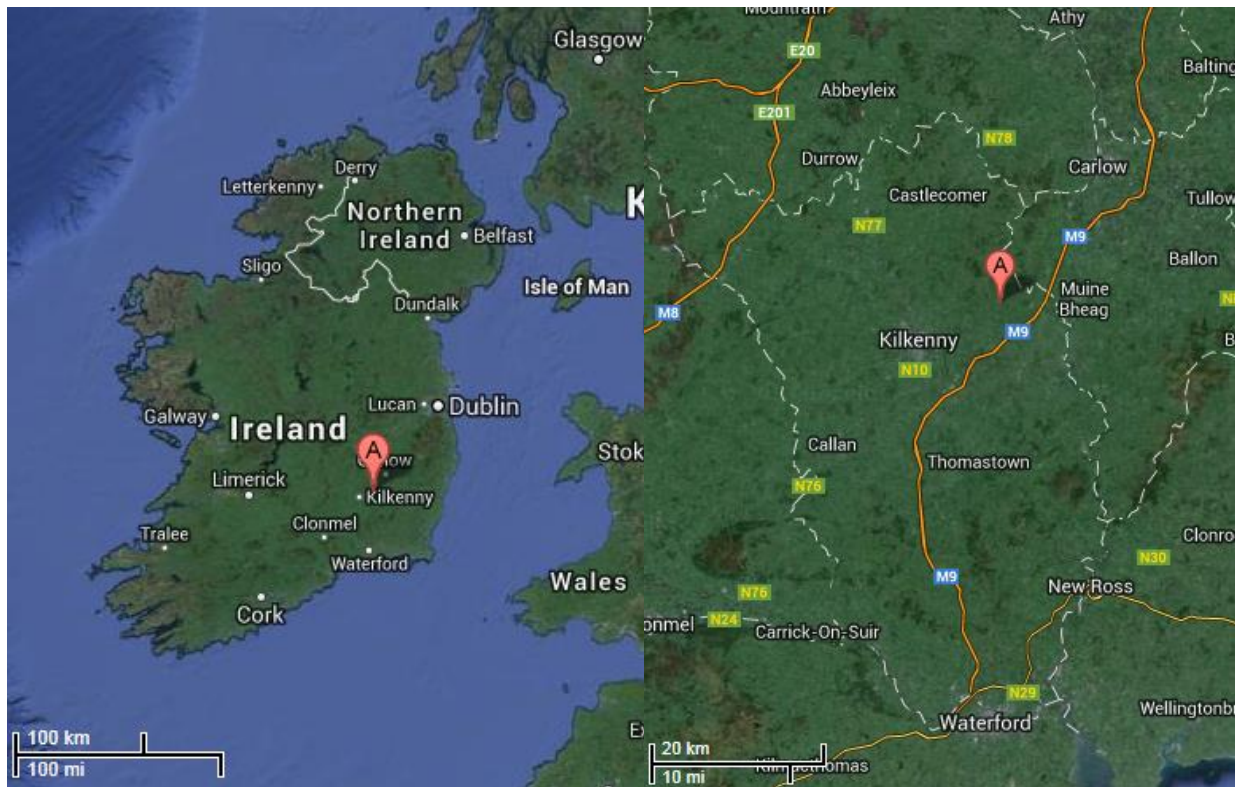
Traced Location in Country of Origin

The earliest known ancestor was John Langton born about 1838 in Ireland. He died on 17 Apr 1894 in Brentford, Middlesex, England. He married Margaret Brennan in about 1861. She was born about 1834 in Castlewarren, Kilkenny, Ireland. She died on 30 Dec 1911 in Brentford, Middlesex, England. Together they had 5 children: Mary Ann, Thomas, John, Ellen Margaret and James William.

Thomas John Langton who came to Canada in 1911 was his grandson. The line of descent is as follows:

- John Langton wife Margaret Brennan
- Thomas Langton wife Fanny Susanna Laidler
- Thomas John Langton wife Mary Ivy Botheras Hawken
