

LANGTONS OF BARTON, ONTARIO

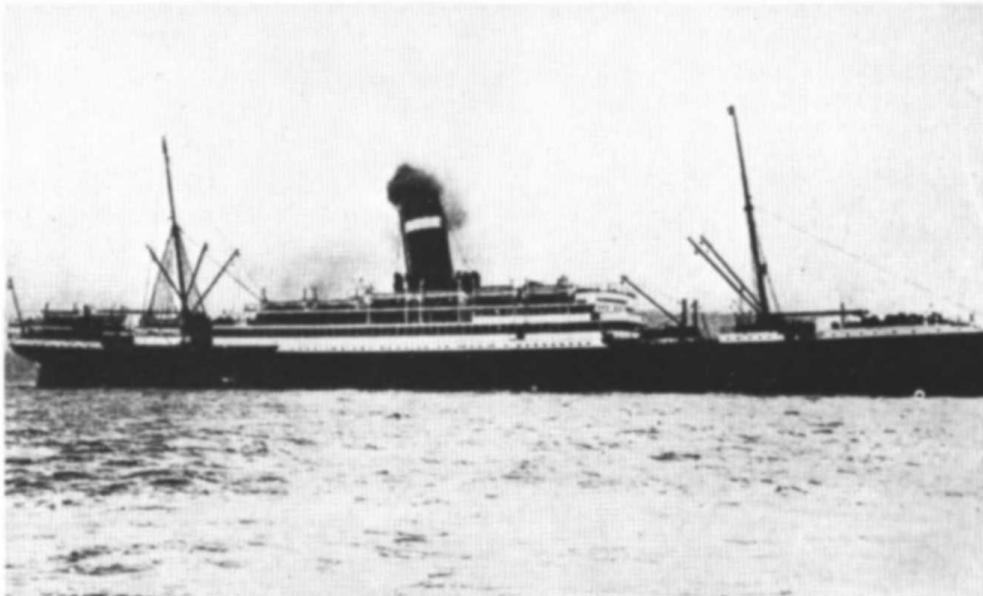
Arrival in Canada

Three sons of Thomas Langton (1852-1886) and Caroline Pallet (1847-1926) of Leicestershire, England, came to Canada between 1904 and 1920. Walter Ernest Langton (1878-1959) was the first to arrive on 15 Mar 1904 with his wife Dianah Sarson (b.1880). They initially headed for Winnipeg and spent several years in Edmonton before finally moving to the USA on 06 Nov 1919 with their son Walter Arthur Langton (b.1908 in Alberta). Arthur Langton (1873-1959) was the next to arrive on 24 Mar 1911 with his wife Selina Elizabeth Payne (b.1872) and their two children Doris May (b.1899) and Arthur Ernest (b.1900). A third child, Walter Sydney Langton, was born on 22 January 1915 in Edmonton. It is believed that the children moved to the USA. The last to arrive in Canada was George Tom Langton.

George Tom Langton is the patriarch of this family in Barton, Ontario. He was born on 24 Oct 1880 in Belgrave, Leicestershire, England. He married Agnes Meadows on 23 Jul 1905. She was born on 22 Oct 1879, daughter of Arthur James Meadows and Alice Ann Hill. George Tom arrived in Quebec aboard the Victorian on 20 Oct 1920, without his family. He was a Hosiery Finisher and his passage had been paid for by his new employer. He was headed to the recently expanded Mercury Mills Plant in the city of Hamilton, Ontario. His wife and two sons, William Arthur and Kenneth Tom, join him the following spring when they arrived in Quebec on the Canada on 30 Apr 1921. George Tom Langton died on 19 Jan 1963 in St Petersburg, Florida, USA. He is buried in the Woodland Cemetery of Hamilton, Ontario.

William Arthur Langton was born on 17 Nov 1905 in Leicestershire, England. He married Mary Louise Leblanc on 10 Sep 1932, daughter of Isaac James Leblanc and Margaret Bradley. He was a Hosiery Machinist. His brother Kenneth Tom Langton was born on 07 Apr 1917 in Leicestershire, England.

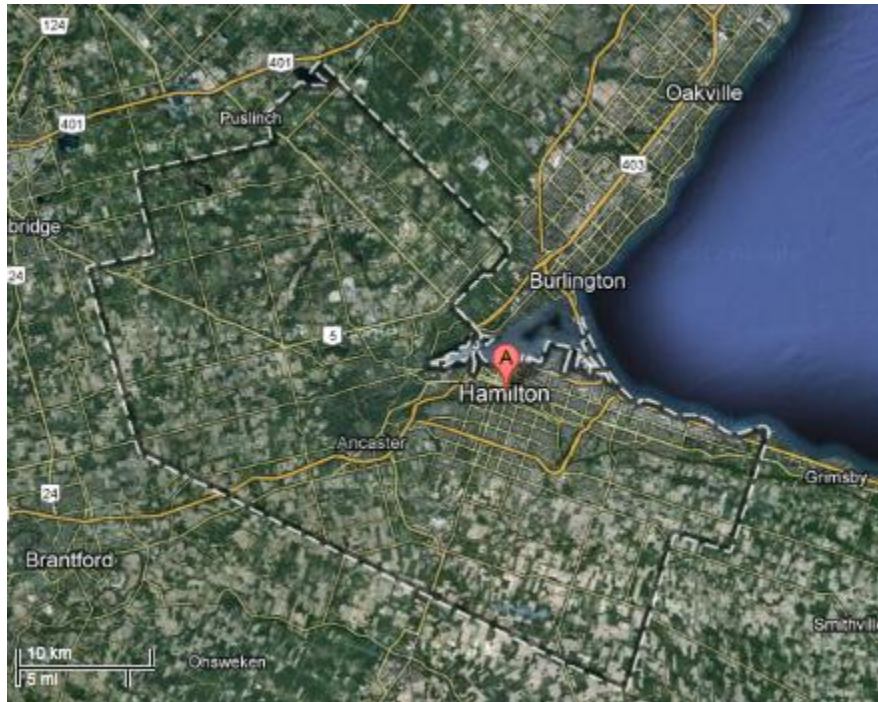
Victorian Operated by Allen Line Built by Workman, Clark & Co., Belfast, Ireland.



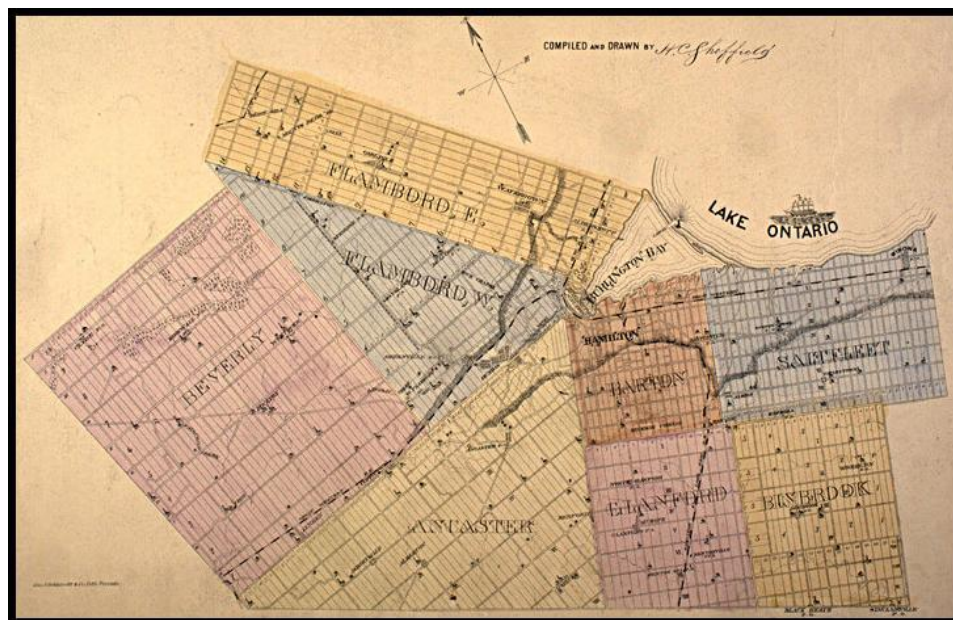
Traced Location in Canada

According to the 1935 and 1940 Voters Lists, George Tom Langton and his family lived on Edgemont Street and Garside Avenue in Barton, Wentworth County (in the present day Hamilton area).

Traced Location in Country of Origin

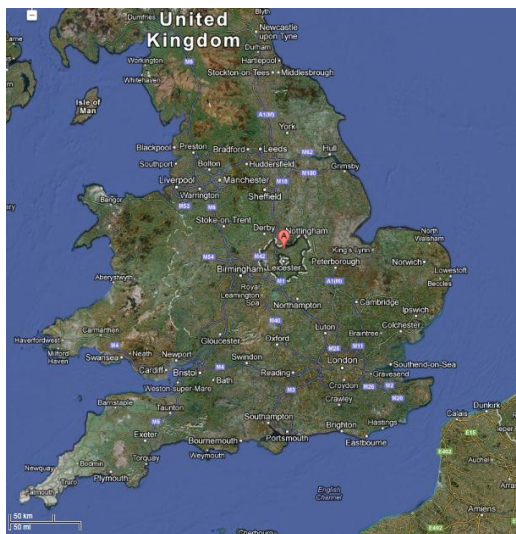
The earliest ancestor in England is probably John Langton of Teeton, Northamptonshire and London. He died Feb 1725. He was a merchant and purchased the Teeton Manor from the Breton family in 1718.

George Tom Langton who came to Canada in 1920 would be his 6x great grandson. The line of descent is suggested to be as follows:

- John Langton wife Unknown Bennet
- Sheriff Thomas Langton* wife Elizabeth Stratton
- Esquire John Langton wife Unknown
- Unknown Langton
- Thomas Langton wife Unknown
- Unknown Langton
- Thomas Langton wife Ann Baum
- Thomas Langton Caroline Pallet
- George Tom Langton wife Agnes Meadows

*Sheriff Thomas Langton died 21 Aug 1762 and was buried 4 days later at Ravensthorpe Church. He had two sons, Esquire John Langton and Thomas Langton who was also Sheriff of Northamptonshire.
